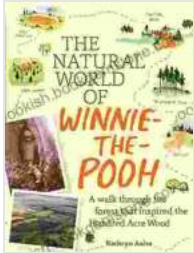

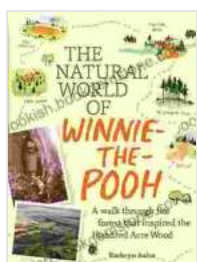
- The forest is open to the public 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

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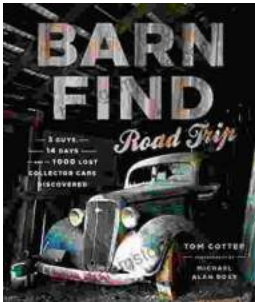
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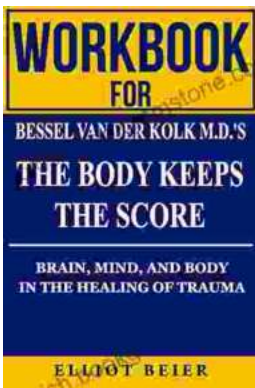
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
